

## The International Affairs Budget Working for Delaware

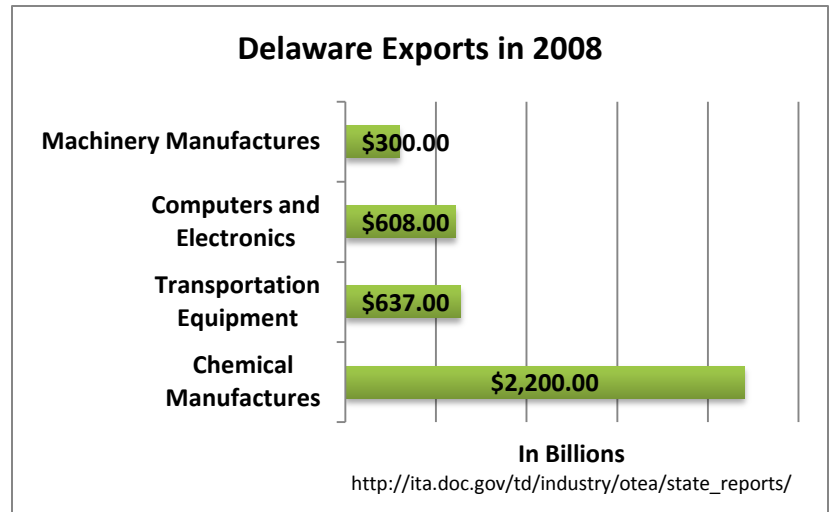
### Employment

- Trade supported 94,483 jobs in Delaware in 2006, or 18.2% of total jobs, up from 9.7% in 1992.<sup>1</sup> Almost one-eighth (12.2%) of all manufacturing workers in Delaware depended on exports for their jobs.<sup>2</sup>
- In 2007, 27,800 people in Delaware were employed by U.S. affiliates of companies that are at least 50% foreign-owned.<sup>3</sup>



### Trade

- Delaware exported \$4.9 billion in merchandise to 144 foreign markets in 2008 (a 138% increase over 2004). Delaware's largest market in 2008 was the United Kingdom (\$1.1 billion), followed by Canada (\$889 million), Germany (\$486 million), China (\$284 million), and Japan (\$264 million).<sup>4</sup>
- In 2007, 836 companies exported goods from Delaware. Of these, 84% were small- and medium-sized enterprises with fewer than 500 employees.<sup>5</sup>
- Agricultural exports are important to Delaware's economy, totaling \$248 million in 2008.<sup>6</sup>
- Since 2005, the U.S. Export-Import Bank has financed over \$210 million in exports from 12 companies in 3 communities in Delaware.<sup>7</sup>



### Education

- In 2007-2008, 1,737 students studied abroad, an 11.3% increase over the previous academic year.<sup>8</sup>
- During 2008-2009, 1,672 international students were enrolled in Delaware colleges and universities and contributed \$37.4 million to the Delaware economy.<sup>9</sup>

### International Assistance Programs



- Since 1961, 441 Peace Corps volunteers from Delaware have served in dozens of countries overseas.<sup>10</sup>
